Location: KCC operates a flexible working approach, a hybrid of office/site

and remote working. The post holder is not expected to be located in Kent, but they should have the ability to travel to Kent to attend

meetings and site visits that may occasionally be required.

Purpose of the Job:

To advise on the ecological implications of development, strategic planning and other proposals; ensuring the planning authority meets wildlife legislation, policy requirements and duties and effectively protects, manages and enhances the biodiversity of Kent.

To support the development and implementation of biodiversity projects and initiatives.

Main duties and responsibilities:

- Deliver the Ecological Advice Service to KCC's Planning Application Group and the county's local planning authorities. This work will require the post holder to:
 - Provide ecological advice at any stage as requested within the development management process (pre-application, screening, scoping, formal application and enforcement).
 - Assess, and advise on, ecological impacts and appropriateness of any proposed mitigation and biodiversity enhancement measures.
 - o Assess, and advice on, biodiversity net gain information and plans.
 - Support strategic work to prepare the county for the implementation of biodiversity net gain
 - o Attend, and contribute to, meetings with developers/applicants pre- and post-submission.
 - Attend, and input to, planning committees, planning inquiries and appeal hearings.
 - Provide impartial assessment of the recommendations of statutory and non-statutory conservation organisations in relation to planning applications and other planning documents.
 - o Provide input to the local plans and other forward/strategic planning.
 - Undertake ecological assessments of hedgerows for which a removal notice has been submitted, to ensure compliance with the Hedgerow Regulations 1997.
 - o Provide general advice on biodiversity issues.
 - o Provide training for development management staff and planning committees.
 - Deliver the County Council's ecological input to strategies, plans, major development proposals and consultations.

0	Provide ecological advice to various KCC departments, providing scrutiny of, and advice on, ecological surveys to ensure compliance with biodiversity and protected species legislation, policy and best practice. To provide training, where required, for KCC staff and members on biodiversity.
0	Provide support, under the direction of the team manager, in other tasks necessary to the functioning of the Natural Environment and Coast Team.
